


















DEAN'S MESSAGE



Welcome to the 2020-2021 Annual Report of the George A. Smathers Libraries.

The academic year was a challenging time for the University of Florida and the Libraries since campus was closed for a portion of the time. I am proud of the extra efforts by our faculty and staff to continue to serve our students and faculty with as many library services as possible. Subject Specialists were always available to answer questions and present virtual instruction.

Most Libraries faculty and staff worked remotely and continued to provide services virtually. The

Ask a Librarian service increased by 1,997% over the previous academic year. Library instruction dropped by only 11% because there was an increase in virtual instruction as physical instruction was suspended.

The virtual library continued to be 100% open and available 24-hours a day. All of the libraries and collections displayed newly designed and updated web sites for students, faculty and researchers to visit and explore.

Front door pickup for Libraries' materials began in the 2020 Summer B semester with pickups available at Library West and the Health Science Center Library. The buildings reopened for the Summer 2021 semesters with most in-person services restored. Safety precautions were in place and food and beverages were restricted. Attendance was down in all branch libraries during the year.

This report highlights the acquisitions, internships, exhibits and events, and the extra efforts put forth by faculty and staff during the transitional period. We are thankful to the University and local communities for the support received during this time.

GRADUATE INTERNSHIPS



Oral History Metadata Creation, Records Management and Content Curation

Led by Xiaoli Ma

In order to facilitate improved access to and use of the Samuel Proctor Oral History Program (SPOHP) collections and to support the program in seeking digitization grants, the internship reviewed the materials currently hosted by University of Florida Digital Collections (UFDC) and compared with SPOHP holdings, before adding missing materials and new content to fill in the gaps.

Hybrid Collection Exhibitions

Led by Lourdes Santamaría-Wheeler

A museum studies graduate student was introduced to best practices in exhibition research and design, particularly as it applies to hybrid collections such as the Panama Canal Museum Collection (PCMC). The student applied the newly gathered information to develop an oral history interview script, enhance metadata on a minimum of 50 PCMC items and create a preliminary object spreadsheet for a future exhibit focused on education or healthcare in the Panama Canal Zone. West Indian and Afro-Caribbean content is among the most requested topic in the Collection and as such, the internship deliverables were a direct response to that need.

Curation and Collection Development for the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature

Led by Suzan Alteri

The intern supported the Libraries' efforts to identify children's nature periodicals and to provide intellectual context and metadata to the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature digital collection—http://ufdc.ufl.edu/juv. The project identified current holdings of children's nature periodicals in the Baldwin Library and suggested other titles for acquisition based on collection strengths and weaknesses. The largest part of the project digitally mapped 20th century environmental education practices present in three of the collection's 20th-century periodicals with a total of 327 issues.

Hip-Hop and Technology

Led by Sam Putnam

The internship in hip-hop and technology provided a graduate student focusing on sound studies in the University of Florida (UF) Department of English with an opportunity to engage with, create programming, and design resources for the hip-hop community at UF. The intern, with the support of the internship director, created programs and events at the intersection of hip-hop and technology and established recommendations for technology and resources related to hip-hop at Marston Science Library.

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Justice

Led by Twanna Hodge

The goal was to advance the Libraries' and the University's commitment to continuously developing and retaining a diverse workforce through developing a diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice (DEIJ) curriculum as a foundation for employee development in these areas. The end goal was to have a self-paced curriculum that empowers employees to learn about the many facets of DEIJ to help in creating a more respectful, caring community for all and a welcoming and inclusive environment.

The project was grounded in assessment research methods examining existing data generated during Collaborating with Strangers (CoLAB) Workshops from 2009 through 2019. Images hosted in the UF Digital Collections (UFDC) featuring Special Collections holdings were used to curate a digital and printed version of a book published by the LibraryPress@UF. Thousands of workshop participant answers to the last profile question, "What's one thing most people don't know about you?" were coded and combined with curated images that reflect those answers using diverse Special Collections digital images selected from UFDC items. https://ufdc.ufl.edu/

NOTEWORTHY ACQUISITIONS

COVID-19 Florida Farmworkers Collection

Data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) shows that the pandemic has had a disproportionate impact on people from historically underrepresented and racialized communities in the United States. Florida's farmworkers have been particularly affected since the beginning of the pandemic.

This collection captures the impact that COVID-19 had on farmworkers in Florida and is part of the Florida Latin American and Caribbean Diaspora Initiative, providing access to the experience of Latin American and Caribbean immigrants in the state.



The Florida Industrial School for Boys, established near Marianna, Florida, in 1900, became infamous for abusive treatment of youth sent to live and work there. In response to interest in the investigations at Dozier, the P.K. Yonge Library has acquired collections, made possible through the support of the Todd C. Prosser Memorial and Ted C. Prosser III Book

Endowment in Florida History. Titles include Roger Dean Kiser's The White House Boys (2009), one of the longest and most in-depth memoirs of a former white student/inmate at the school; Dark Days of Horror at Dozier (2013), which includes accounts by former Black inmates; and Lies Uncovered: The Long Journey Home (2019).

A Hebrew and English and English and Hebrew Dictionary with Roots and Abbreviations

Title page emphasizes Abigail's relation to her father: "Third Daughter of David Abarbanel Lindo." The printer, Samuel Meldola, also notes that the book is "not published:" a convention in early 19th century Britain by which a woman could modestly put forward her work.

In mid-19th century London, a woman called Abigail Lindo quietly published a Hebrew and English dictionary. Abigail was only the seventh woman to compile a dictionary translating between English and another language, and she was the first to deal solely with the Hebrew language. Printed by Samuel Meldola, London, in 1846.




Free Our Mamas, Sisters, Queens (2020)

The prints in this limited-edition portfolio are executed on paper handmade from pulped criminal records as a part of the People's Paper Co-Op Art and Advocacy project. The group partners with formerly incarcerated women and legal advocacy teams to call attention to the need for justice in punishment and to help individuals re-enter society after satisfying the terms of their incarceration. The designs are done by local and national graphic artists, many of them women of color. This acquisition provides a gateway for new audiences to see themselves and engage with the collection and has featured in several collaborative exhibitions since the re-opening of campus, including a student-curated exhibition on Afrofuturism

Charles Daubuz: Perpetual Commentary on the Revelation of St. John

This early eighteenth-century commentary on the book of Revelations has been annotated on every page by members of the Adams family. The bibliophile Thomas Adams (a distant relation of John Adams) added his own perpetual commentary to every page of the



book: turning its pages into a compendium of ancient, historical, and contemporary thought on a wide range of topics. His daughter, Hannah, the

first American woman to work professionally as a writer, later owned the book and may have used it to complement her writings on religion.

Library of Luise White, Emerita

Professor Emerita Luise White's donated materials include about 250 books accepted for the collection, including many Rhodesian soldiers' privately published memoirs relating to the so-called Bush War (1964-1979), also known as the Zimbabwe War of Liberation or

Second Chimurenga. Materials in Prof. White's gift also include recorded oral history interviews and transcripts from her extensive career researching diverse topics that include the lives of sex workers in Nairobi, political assassination, and the role of rumor in colonial East and Central Africa.

Daniel Lewis Collection

The papers of the famed dancer and choreographer, Daniel Lewis. For twelve years beginning in 1962 and in the Yiddish Theatre from 1960 to 1964. He also danced with the José Limón Dance Company as well as with a companies of Ruth Currier, Felix Fibich, Stuart Hodes, Sofie Maslow, David Wood, Norman Walker, Matthew Diamond, Charles Weidman, Anna Sokolow, American Dance Theater, The Juilliard Dance Ensemble, Contemporary Dance System, Daniel Lewis Dance, plus others. This material will be used by dance and performing arts students and any researcher interested in his amazing career.

Brad Wilde Postcard Collection

An incredible collection of more than 15,000 digitized postcards and hundreds of original postcards will have a significant impact on scholarship and teaching for years to come. The Brad Wilde Postcard Collection is spectacular for its breadth and depth of photographic documentation of the Canal Zone and Panama.

In addition to postcards produced by publishers using lithograph or offset-printing processes, the collection includes over 6,000 real photo postcards, which are photographic images printed on postcard stock. Several postcards include correspondence written by a variety of people including Canal employees and their family members, American and foreign tourists, service men and women, and others. This is a treasure trove for researchers seeking firsthand perspectives (albeit brief ones) of the Canal and Panama.




